The National Government Constituencies Development Fund (NG-CDF) is a decentralised fund established by the Government to promote socio- economic development at the grassroots level and address regional inequality throughout the country. The Fund was created by then CDF Act 2003 that came into effect on 15th April 2004. The 20th anniversary of the Fund is therefore a key milestone to celebrate in 2024. # INTRODUCTION OF THE FUND

- Twenty years ago, precisely 2003, a unique development concept was born in Kenya through the enactment of the Constituencies Development Fund (CDF) Act 2003, resulting in the birth of the Fund as is known to date.
- The CDF Act 2003 was initiated through a private members Bill by Hon. Sen (Eng.) Muriuki Karue then Member of Parliament for Ol Kalou Constituency.
- The CDF Act 2003 was assented to on 30th December, 2003 but officially commenced on 15th April, 2004.
- In April 2024, The Fund will be 20 years, a period which has seen tremendous impact in development.

# 2 | PRE-CDF KENYA DEVELOPMENT TERRAIN



Prior to 2004, most of the development programmes in Kenya were conducted within the District Focus for Rural Development (DFRD) Strategy framework which was implemented through Government Ministries, State Corporations, Local Authorities, Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) with limited involvement of private sector. However, this development framework was characterized by many challenges, including:

- Limited citizen involvement in planning, implementation, management and sustenance of development projects;
- Predominantly Government controlled development coordination structure;
- Donor dependent development with minimal Government budgetary input; Lack of legal framework to guarantee continuous flow of resources;
- Overburdening the citizens with self-help contributions through harambee fund raising approaches;
- Skewed development with visible national disparities.
- Slow community development evidenced by inadequate socio-economic infrastructure leading to low school enrolment, high insecurity incidences and low access to Government administrative services;
- Inadequate education financing resulting in poor education access, transition from primary to secondary and subsequently tertiary level; and Inadequate critical facilities in schools, especially science laboratories compromising quality learning and uptake of science subjects.
- Overburdening the citizens with self-help contributions through harambee fund raising approaches for school fees, school development and medical bills.

# 3 EVOLUTION OF THE NATIONAL GOVERNMENT CONSTITUENCIES DEVELOPMENT FUND

NG-CDF has undergone significant evolution since its establishment in 2003. Here are distinct phases and the key milestones per phase.


## i. Initial Establishment of the Fund (2003-2007):

- Establishment of the Fund:** The Constituencies Development Fund was established by the CDF Act, 2003. The Act provided that 2.5% of all ordinary Government revenue collected in every financial year be paid into the Fund and disbursed under the direction of National Management Committee (NMC) constituted as per section 5 of that Act.
- A total of Kshs. 1,260,000,000 was released to the constituencies during the 2003/2004 financial year. This amount was fully disbursed to the then 210 constituencies in accordance with the provisions of section 19 of the CDF Act 2003. Each constituency received Kshs. 6 million for projects.
- In 2005, the Parliamentary Committee overseeing the Fund then known as

Constituencies Fund Committee (CFC) conducted a review of the CDF and suggested changes that would improve its planning and implementation. In its report, the CFC proposed, among other things, a system of receiving and dealing with complaints in project planning, and to precisely define a system and authority to allocate funds.

- Expansion and Growth of the Fund:** As the Economy grew, the Fund increased steadily buoyed by economic reforms introduced during the first term of President Mwai Kibaki’s Government resulting in higher GDP growth hence expansion of the National revenue in the subsequent periods. By financial year 2007/2008 the allocation to the Fund had grown to Ksh. 10.1 billion, Ksh. 23.06 billion by 2013/2014 financial year, Ksh. 33.2 billion in FY 2018/2019, 41.75 billion in financial year 2019/2020 and now Ksh. 53.53 billion in the current year FY 2023/2024.

### iii. Legislative Reforms:

- **The enabling legislation**, CDF Act 2003, was repealed in the year 2013 through enactment of CDF ACT 2013. The new Act was aimed at addressing governance challenges including transparency & accountability; effectiveness and efficiency in the management; and aligning the Fund to the Constitution of Kenya 2010.
- The National Government Constituencies Development Fund (NG-CDF) Act 2015 was enacted following the high court determination that the CDF Act of 2013 was unconstitutional.
- NG-CDF Regulations, 2016 provided guidelines for effective implementation of the NGCDF Act 2015.


### iv. Administrative Reforms:

- **Capacity Building Initiatives:** The Board has overtime spearheaded capacity building

programmes aimed to enhance the skills and capabilities of the Fund's implementing and coordinating structures.

- **Efforts were made to digitize** NG-CDF processes, including the development of online platforms for project proposal submission, monitoring, and reporting, leading to increased transparency and accountability in fund utilisation.
- **Focus on Results and Impact:** From 2015/2016 financial year, the Board put all Constituency Development Fund Committees on Performance Contracts signed annually with the Board to tie constituencies programme implementation to pre-negotiated and agreed targets. These are evaluated every year and results shared with the constituencies for the purpose of entrenching the culture of continual improvement for excellency in performance.

## Evolution of the Fund




# 4 | NG-CDF THE GAME CHANGER:

## *Why has this unique NG-CDF model succeeded?*

The National Government Constituencies Development Fund successfully introduced a unique model, the first of its kind in the public sector, characterized by minimum administrative cost and bureaucratic red tape.

**a. At the national level,** the NG-CDF Act introduced upper limit to the administration costs budget where Board's administrative

expenses are capped at a maximum of five per cent (5%) of the annual allocation to the Fund while a minimum of 95% is disbursed to the 290 constituencies as a development grant, ensuring that greater proportion of the annual allocation to the Fund is channelled to development projects directly benefiting the communities at the grassroots level.



**b. At the constituency level,** the administrative expenses for a Constituency Development Fund Committee NG-CDFC are capped at a maximum of 6% of the annual allocation to the constituency, compelling a minimum of 94% of the allocations to be available for projects proposed by members of the community.

**c. At the community level,** the identification of projects is done through open public meetings convened in each ward by the Chairman of the Constituency Development Fund Committee, while implementation and management of projects is done by the community through

the Project Management Committees (PMC). The Act limits the PMC administrative costs to a maximum of 5%, therefore, the bulk of the fund is channelled towards the costs of project implementation. Further, the public participation in project identification and implementation not only results in cost-effectiveness but also a higher sense of community ownership hence post-project sustainability.

# 5 | NG-CDF GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE


The Fund, which is currently domiciled in the National Treasury and Economic Planning, is managed by the NG-CDF Board at the National level, the National Government Constituency Development Fund

Committee (NG-CDFC) at the Constituency level and implemented by Project Management Committee (PMC) at the community level.


## MANAGEMENT OF THE FUND

The Act places the oversight function of the Fund directly under the National Assembly through the National Assembly Select Committee (NASC) on NG-CDF which oversees the implementation of the NG-CDF Act including reviewing the policy framework and legislations that may arise in relation to the

Fund; the Departmental Committee on Finance and Economic Planning (DCFEP) to ensure budgetary allocations to the Fund; and the Decentralised Funds Accounts Committee (DFAC) which reviews the Auditor General's reports on the Fund.

# 6 BASIS OF BUDGET CEILINGS FOR EACH CONSTITUENCY

Section 6 of the NG-CDF Act states that the budget ceiling for each Constituency shall be determined by the Board as provided for under Section 34 which stipulates that the budget ceiling for each constituency shall be three quarters of the annual allocation to the Fund (less the portion set aside for the Board’s administration expenses) divided equally among all the constituencies; plus an amount equal to one quarter of the annual allocation to the Fund divided among constituencies taking into consideration the

number of wards in each constituency.

Applying the above criterion to the 2023/2024 allocation to NG-CDF which amounts to Ksh. 53.531 billion, and noting that the constituency with the least number of wards has three (3) while the constituency with the highest number of wards has eight (8), the budget ceilings for constituencies based on the number of Wards in each constituency is summarised below:



# ELIGIBLE AND INELIGIBLE PROJECTS

NG-CDF, prior 2015, supported projects including water, health, roads which have since been left to devolved governments. Since 2015, NG-CDF supports projects that are in line with the functions of the National Government as specified in fourth schedule of the constitution.

**a. Eligible projects under NG-CDF**

Projects falling within the functions of the National Government as outlined in the constitution of Kenya.

**b. Ineligible projects under NG-CDF**

- Projects that are recurrent in nature, except

administrative costs of the Board, NG-CDFC and PMC.

- Projects falling within the devolved functions.
- Projects supporting religious bodies/activities.
- Projects supporting political bodies/activities.
- Projects directly benefitting individuals except education bursaries and social security (primarily, health insurance for vulnerable families)
- Projects involving personal awards whether in cash or kind.


# KEY ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE FUND

The Fund has significantly contributed to enhanced socio-economic development of the people at the grassroots level throughout the Country in the following sectors.

### a. School infrastructure development

- Since its inception in 2003, the NG-CDF has facilitated establishment of 3,087 new schools.
  - 1,369 (44.35%) primary schools and 1,718 (55.65%) secondary schools.
- 1,660 (53.8%) were fully funded while 1,427 (46.2%) of the schools were partially funded.
- The 3,087 schools established through NG-CDF funding accounts for 26.6% of the 11,612 schools established in the country between 2003 and June 2023 as per data retrieved from the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) Economic Survey report.
- The Fund has also financed initiation of sixteen (16) schools catering for special needs education.

## Schools Established Through NG-CDF Since Funding Inception 2003




### i. Learning opportunity

- The 3,087 schools initiated through NG-CDF funding have created opportunity for 882,026 learners to have access to primary and secondary level education on eight (8) year and four (4) year basis respectively.
  - Out of the 882,026 students enrolled in the schools initiated by the Fund, 433,735 (49.2%) are males while 448,291 (50.8%) are females. Further, out of the 882,026 students, 3,746 students are persons with disabilities.
- The total enrolment in primary schools is 381,363 pupils while in secondary schools is 500,663 students.
- On average each of NG-CDF initiated primary schools can accommodate more than two hundred and seventy eight (278) pupils while each secondary school can accommodate more than two hundred and ninety-two (292) students on one year learning period basis.

### INFRASTRUCTURAL DEVELOPMENT IN SECONDARY AND PRIMARY SCHOOLS




**b. Education bursary**

The Fund has had tremendous achievement in the Bursary Scheme. All constituencies are required to establish a Sub-Committee for effective and efficient administration of the funds allocated to

bursaries. The bursary funds benefit the needy and deserving children from poor backgrounds. The NG-CDF dedicates approximately Ksh. 15 billion annually towards the Bursary Scheme. On average 1.2 million needy students benefit annually.

### c. Technical Training Institutes (TTIs)

In partnership with Ministry of Education, the Fund has supported construction of 130 TTIs which have not only contributed to a significant increase in the number of skilled workforces for the country's economic development, but has also improved the local economy in the areas they are located by spurring the growth of new business centres creating demand for accommodation facilities and market for the locally produced goods and services to the benefit of the local entrepreneurs.

### d. Kenya Medical Training College campuses


In partnership with Ministry of Health, the Fund has established 61 new Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) campuses. These new KMTC campuses and the infrastructural enhancement in already existing ones, have impacted positively to the people within and outside the communities in the following ways:

- Creation of job opportunities: For instance, the campuses provided employment to approximately 347 academic staff and 277 non-academic staff. In addition, graduates equipped with skills from these campuses secured jobs, with around 1,400 students from one campus alone getting employment.
- Infrastructure Improvement: The Campuses have led to enhancement of road networks, such as tarmacking roads near campuses like Iten and Shianda Mumias, benefitting local residents.
- Increased Enrolment in Medical Courses:

Through these campuses being almost in every constituency, students are now able to commute. This has reduced the cost of education thus fulfilling aspirations for medical education for many students.


- Business Opportunities: These have been created and ranges from development of student hostels to supplying goods and services to campuses, boosting sectors like agribusiness.
- Enhanced Student Support through NG-CDF Bursaries: Most students are sustained in colleges through NG-CDF Bursaries translating to high rates of completion for students having acquired all required skills in their relevant fields.

These campuses have enrolled approximately 13,551 students taking a range of courses. Out of these, 9,735 (71.8%) are females while 3,816 (28.2%) are male students.



**e. National Administration and Security Sector infrastructure**

- Approximately 5.7% of the Fund has been allocated to projects falling under the National Administration and Security sector towards construction and/or renovation of offices, police post and police stations.
- In 2022/2023 FY the Fund financed the construction of 106 Sub County headquarters, 413 Chief’s/Assistant Chief’s offices and construction of 203 police stations/patrol houses and 108 staff houses.
- In addition, construction of high mast security lights in various centres in the country has helped to significantly reduce crime rate and creating conducive business atmosphere thereby enhancing economic standards.



**f. Huduma Centres**

- In partnership with the Ministry Public Service the Fund has financed the establishment of centres in various constituencies to bring government services closer to the people.
- Going forward, the Fund intends to partner with Ministry of Information Communication and Digital Economy to finance the establishment of huduma-jitume centres in constituencies to increase employment opportunities across the country through enhanced youths’ access to online jobs and promoting creative economy.


**g. Social Security**

- The Fund in partnership with the National Social health Insurance Fund finances health insurance premiums for vulnerable households in support of the Government’s Universal Health Coverage Policy. This has contributed to significant improvement of health for the poorest and disadvantaged

**h. Climate Change Mitigation**

- With the latest amendments to the NG-CDF Act assented to by His Excellency the President in December 2023, the Fund enhanced its support to the Government’s climate change mitigation measures by allocating up to 5% of each Constituency’s annual allocation towards the targeted interventions.
- From 2016/17 financial year to date, an approximate of Ksh. 3,351,947,792 has been allocated to environment sector to mitigate climate change in the 290 constituencies. The activities that have been funded therein include restoration of tree cover, energy conservation among other projects geared towards combating climate change. The allocations from 2016/17 to 2022/23 financials are as shown in the bar chart


**Allocation Towards Climate Change Mitigation**



#### j. Preparation of Annual accounts

Since 2013/2014 financial year, the Board has been preparing separate annual accounts for each constituency and submitting the same to the Auditor General by 30th September every year as required by the law. This has contributed to improved accountability in the management of the Fund, since each constituency is audited and reported to the National Assembly separately.

As a result of these efforts, Five (5) constituencies have, so far, been recognised and received awards in the annual Financial Reporting (FiRe) Awards which recognises best practices in financial reporting, excellence and transparency. Constituencies awarded are Thika Town, Mukurweini, Wajir West, Tongaren and Kasipul. Kasipul constituency stands in distinction as it has been awarded for 3 consecutive years.



## 10 THE IMPACT OF NG-CDF PROJECTS AND SUCCESS STORIES OF THE FUND

- The Fund through its allocations towards infrastructure development projects has contributed to creation of demand for construction materials, employment opportunities for skilled and unskilled labour and market for locally produced goods and services.
- Further, the Fund has been instrumental in promoting sustainable development and societal uplift through advancing education, supporting climate change mitigation efforts, aiding initiatives for Persons with Disabilities (PWD), and tackling harmful cultural practices, among other commendable endeavours.
- In the education sector, NG-CDF's initiatives have exceeded mere infrastructure development, contributing to profound shifts in learning standards and community engagement. The impact of the Fund's initiatives is demonstrated by the remarkable success stories emerging from schools and other sectors that were initiated by the Fund. For instance:

#### 1. Algani Girls Secondary school

Algani Girls in Isiolo South Constituency which is fully financed by NGCDF participated in the KCSE examination for the first time in 2021.

The school secured the second-best position in Isiolo County during the 2021 KCSE examination

- In 2022, Algani Girls clinched the prestigious title of the top-performing school in Isiolo County.
- Out of the 56 students who sat for KCSE in 2022, 32 achieved direct university entry grades.
- The school accommodates a population of about 438 students.

## 2. Chalbi Boys Secondary school

Chalbi Boys secondary school in North Horr Constituency emerged as the unparalleled epitome of success during the 2022 KCSE examinations in Marsabit South Sub-County. This exceptional performance not only set them apart but also established them as academic champions, highlighting their unwavering commitment to educational excellence

- The school has so far sent 309 students to university since its inception in 2006.
- In 2023 KCSE Examinations, 68% of the students

attained direct University entry grades.

- Chalbi Boys secondary school boasts of a teaching staff consisting of 25 members with nine (9) of them being former students and beneficiaries of NGCDF's bursary program.
- Despite the challenging arid environment, the school actively participates in environmental conservation initiatives, exemplified by their tree planting efforts involving various trees species.

## 3. T.J. Kajwang Mathare North Secondary School, Ruaraka constituency

This school is strategically located in Ruaraka Constituency; was constructed in a reclaimed dumpsite, and now accommodates about 400 students providing educational opportunities that were once deemed impossible, thanks to the Fund.

## 4. Dago Shabbir Primary School

This school is located in Nyalenda `A` Ward in Kisumu East Constituency; it has not only become a hub of knowledge but has also successfully transformed a once swampy and neglected piece of land into a thriving centre of learning. The remarkable transformation of the swampy area began with comprehensive reclamation initiatives. Drainage

systems were strategically installed to divert excess water, and layers of soil were added to elevate and stabilize the ground. The Fund, dedication to sustainable development has turned what was once considered unsuitable terrain into an educational oasis now accommodating a total population of 532 pupils.

### 5. Nyancho Girls Secondary School

This school has remained a beacon of success and a dedicated rescue centre for girls in Kuria West Constituency. The impact of NG-CDF in this school extends far beyond mere infrastructural developments. These facilities not only provide a physical advancement but also a secure and supportive environment for students. This safe environment serves as a basis for educational path, encouraging not only learning but also addressing critical societal concerns. Notably, the safe spaces

created by the Fund play a critical role in addressing pressing challenges, such as eradicating harmful cultural practices like Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) and early marriages. By ensuring that girls not only access education, but also gain essential skills and confidence, NG-CDF actively contributes to creating a future in which education is a key driver of positive societal change.

- The school was founded strategically to shield girls from the grim practice of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM), this institution stands as a proof of triumph over adversity.
- The school accommodates about 330 students and has become an empowering force; rescuing young girls from the clutches of harmful and repugnant FGM cultural practices.

# 11 | CONCLUSION

- The Fund through its allocations towards infrastructure development projects has contributed to creation of demand for construction materials, employment opportunities for skilled and Unskilled labour and market for locally produced goods and services.

# 12 | CHALLENGES AND WAY FORWARD

- It has been observed that in most Constituencies in our country, the 40% threshold of the allocation for education bursary is insufficient. The National Assembly may wish to consider legislating to enhance this allocation.
- The myriad of litigations on the Constitutionality of the Fund have introduced uncertainty on its very existence and implementation of projects. In view of the fact that the Fund is one of the best managed decentralised Funds that touch on the lives of the of the most vulnerable in our society, there is a need to redouble efforts towards entrenching the Fund in the Constitution.
- Media misrepresentation of issues pertaining to the Fund has created reputational risk and misconception. There is therefore need for frequent civic education and sensitisation to create positive awareness of the Fund. Because of the diverse constituencies mix, the Board is guiding Constituency Development Fund Committees towards fully adopting strategic planning to prioritise community needs within the limited resources.
- In view of cases of duplicity in funding of projects between the Fund, County Governments and the Ministry of Education, there is a need for the National Assembly, Senate and Council of Governors to harmonize the implementation of projects


